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It was at a critical moment in his conversion that Francis of Assisi, kneeling before a crucifix in a crumbling sanctuary, heard Christ's call to "go and rebuild my Church."

At first, Francis took the request quite literally, and committed himself to restoring physical buildings. Eventually, he came to realize that Christ was asking him to rebuild the community of the Church and to engage its people.

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


